ESTABLISHMENT: Holt Hall

PROPOSED ACTIVITY / ENVIRONMENT: Tremendous Trees: young people measure oak trees in the Holt Hall woods

Site of the woods & general considerations:	MEDIUM	Young people and adults	Ensure sites of measuring are appropriate: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Use the woodlands at Old Pollard Wood and beside the driveway along the orienteering course • Woods must be risk assessed on the day of the measuring to ensure that they are safe to use, for example, no branches have blown down. CONSIDERATIONS: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Ensure appropriate staff:student ratio • Clothing –ensure young people are wearing suitable outdoor clothing for the weather, for example, waterproofs or sun hats • Ensure first aid bag is situated in easily accessible location known to adults • Ensure young people have any medicines they may require on them, for example, asthma inhalers 	Ensure leader is experienced in this area of activity and that a 'supervisor' in the group has a first aid qualification and knows where the first aid bag is situated On very windy days, this activity may be cancelled	LOW

Measuring of trees: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Eye pokers • Scratches (from bramble or sticks) • Foot injury • Splinters • Nettle sting • Wandering off • Sickness 	MEDIUM	Young people and adults	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Show young people bramble and nettles, warn of scratches and stings and ask young people to avoid touching these plants • Ensure young people know where agreed boundaries are • Use of equipment to be demonstrated by Holt Hall teacher • Young people must behave appropriately • Young people must be told not to eat anything that they find in the woods, even if it looks edible, for instance, nuts, berries & fungi • Remind young people to walk in the woods & pick up their feet to minimise tripping 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Adult supervision and modelling of behaviours. • Adults to know location of first aid bag & which staff are first aid qualified (all teachers at Holt Hall have current first aid qualifications) 	LOW
